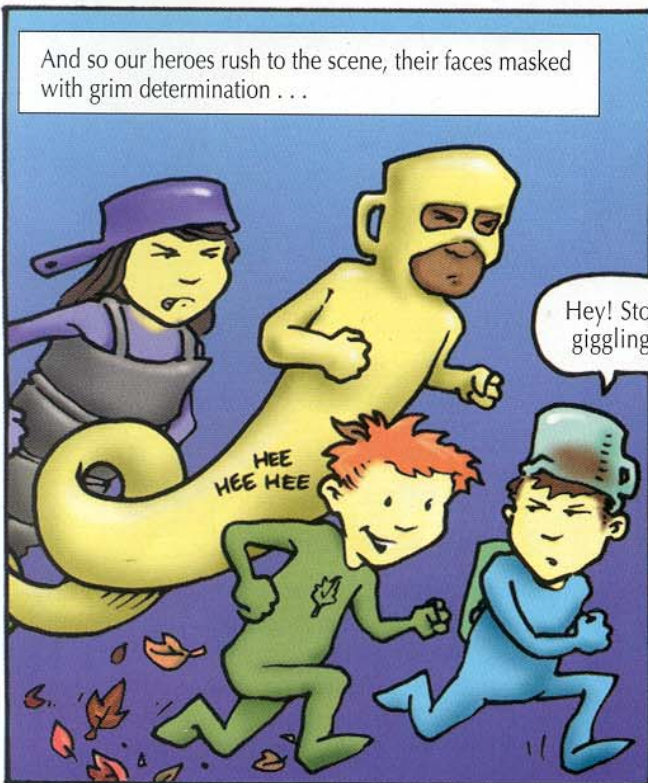
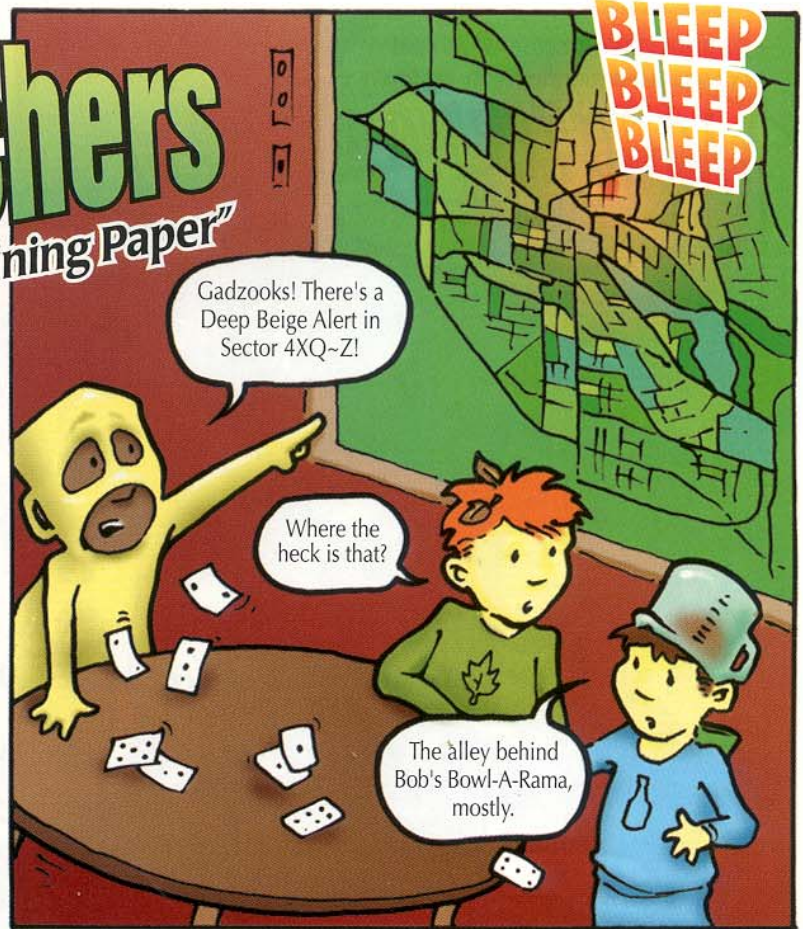


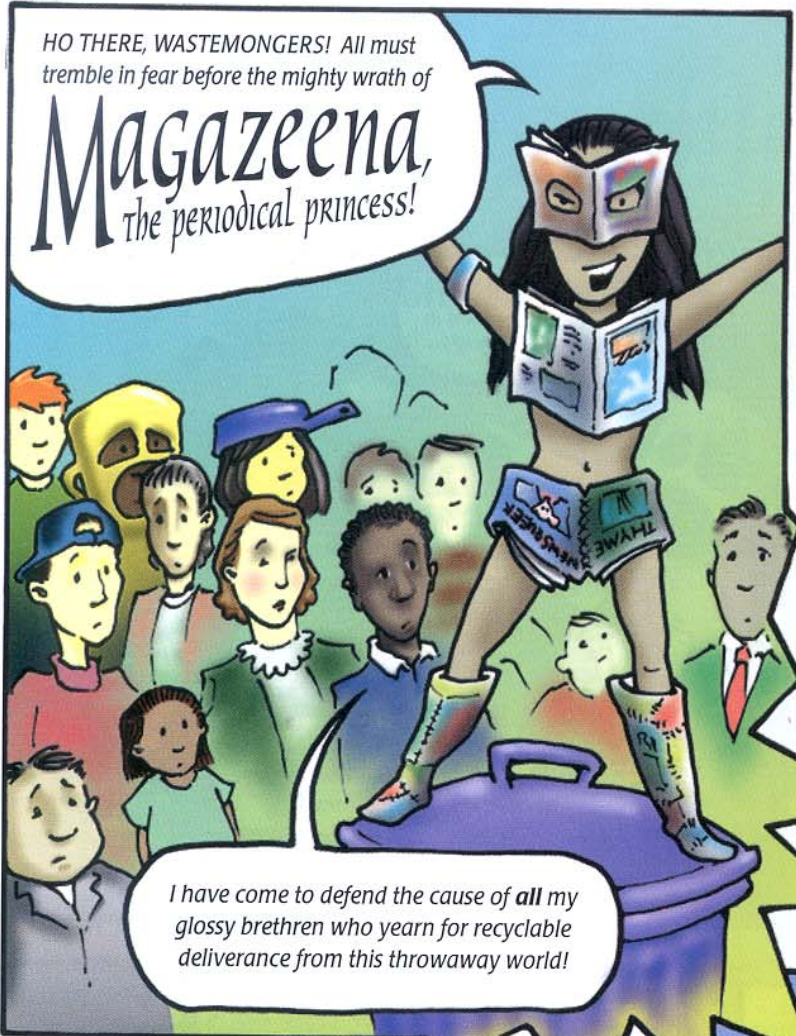

But... I thought these magazines were supposed to go into the garbage!



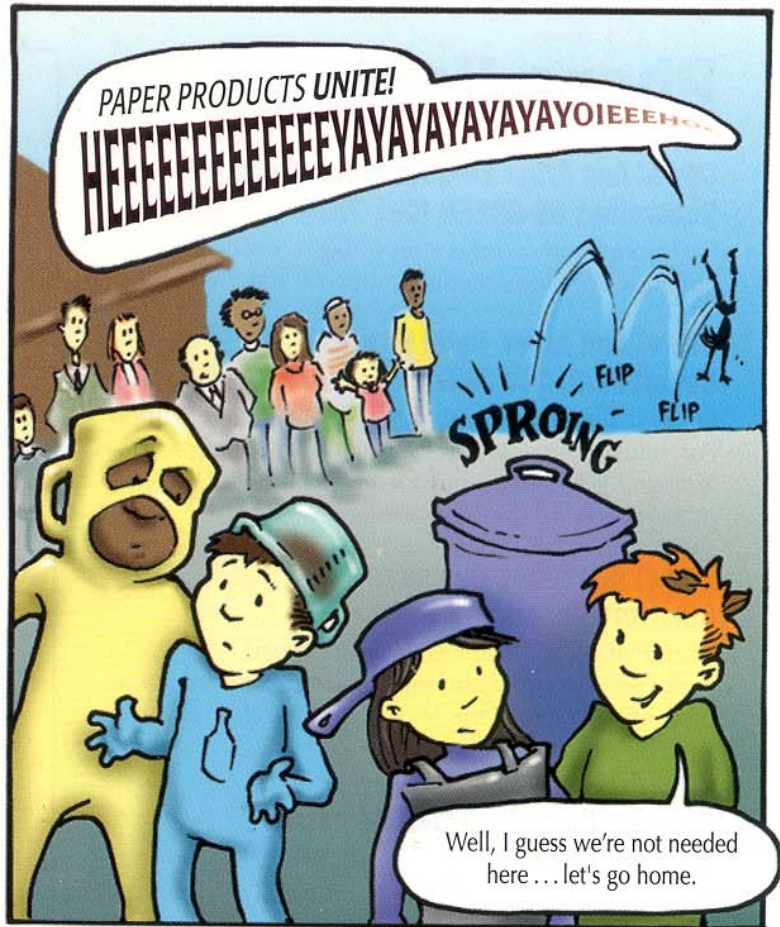
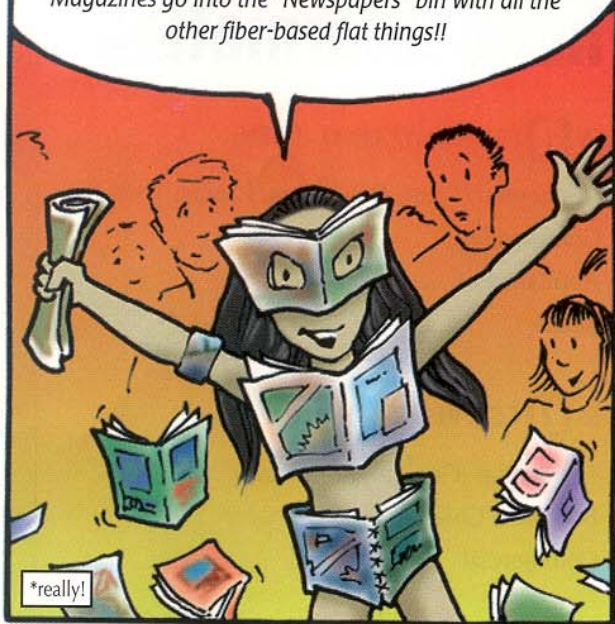
MISINFORMED MALEFACTOR! You shall feel the sting of my rolled-up copy of **National Geographic!***
